

<u>@Fiona_Clarke_@milton_damian</u> I am increasingly seen a recognition PDA strategies seem to replicate "common practice". I have also argued elsewhere, that reason for protecting PDA from PBS/ ABA (to maintain a person's key coping mechanisms) is applicable for autistic persons & stimming.

@Fiona Clarke @milton damian Others share your concerns, Fiona & are making them.

<u>@Fiona Clarke @milton damian</u> Reflecting upon it. "PDA Profile of ASD" supporters cannot accept PBS should not be used on autistic persons/ those with neurodiversity categories, as it undermines a key reason for diagnosing PDA; that PDA has distinct & separate strategies from autism.

<u>@Fiona_Clarke_@milton_damian</u> As soon as you start saying ABA/ PBS does not work for most autistics & should not be used with most autistics. That PDA strategies replicate good practice. Then PDA is on ethically dodgy ground, but it also removes a key reason for recognising & diagnosing PDA.

<u>@Fiona Clarke @milton damian</u> Add to this context, PDA does seem to make a difference in success of educational placement.



<u>@Fiona_Clarke_@milton_damian</u> Some schools are denying placements to CYP with PDA diagnoses.
